From the **Principal's Office**

Dear Friends of Emanuel School

This year has been one of change and consolidation, my second year in this wonderful community as Principal. We shine as a school through our students, and through you who have graduated as highly valued members of the

community. Our students are the reason for our commitment to the School and to continuing to improve what we do to enhance their learning. Along with all of the singing, music making, debating, playing sport, public speaking, classroom learning and range of activities that our students have undertaken this year, there are a number of special programs of which we are particularly proud.

One initiative this year has been to enhance the authenticity of our education in and appreciation of Aboriginal heritage. We have developed a relationship, through an Eco-guide based in the Northern Territory, with a remote Aboriginal school at Jilkminggan. September and October of this year saw two groups of our students and teachers fly to Darwin to immerse themselves in Aboriginal culture and the landscape of the far north, and to visit the Jilkminggan students. As David Whitcombe, one of the teachers who led a group on tour, said: 'The educational magic occurred the next morning when we returned to Jilkminggan School. We split into three groups and shadowed local indigenous students for four hours in their classrooms. Hour by hour the students opened up to the Emanuel students as they literally worked together on maths, english, art and craft, games, dancing and story telling.'

Martin Seligman, who is one of the founders of positive education, says that the most effective way to build a life where one flourishes is through being purposeful and meaningful. This is established when one moves out of their comfort zone and works for the good of others. Emanuel students have a very strong sense of community service and this year we have been further increasing their opportunities to make a difference in their community. All Year 9 students participated in a community service program, where one afternoon per week they went to different venues to help out. Our students regularly work with the Eastern Respite group, helping with the disabled children, and other groups go to Our Big Kitchen each week and Montefiore Home to assist there.

I hope that you enjoy reading this newsletter and keeping in touch with Emanuel School. Best wishes for the holiday period.



Emanuel Old Scholar Elected to

Zionist Youth Council

Jonno Baker (Class of 2008) writes...

I have been to three schools in my life: Bellevue Hill Public School from Years K-6, Cranbrook School from Years 7-8 and Emanuel from Years 9-12. I can safely say that Emanuel School helped make those years the happiest of my life. I have also been part of *Netzer* since I was in Year 8 and that organisation led me to Emanuel School. I graduated in 2008 and went on *Shnat* with *Netzer* the following year.

I came back to a Jewish community that was more active than I had first thought. Soon after arriving home, I was elected *Rosh Machane* for the 2010 Winter Camp (which was a resounding success) and was then elected as the 2011 *Rosh Chinuch (Netzer's* Head of Education for NSW).

After a very successful year, I have been voted into the position of *Rosh Chinuch* of ZYC (Zionist Youth Council). ZYC acts as an umbrella organisation for all youth movements and serves as a middleman for Jewish youth, striving for the best of resources and representing them in the community.

My aims for next year can be summed up in one word: tolerance. Through

several inter-movement events, uniting Jews of different backgrounds and by setting up an inter-faith event for leaders of different youth groups, 'tolerance' can be within our grasp. What is important is exposure to others of different beliefs, both within a Jewish and multi-cultural context. It is within this framework that we can work towards communal tolerance as well as active participation in dialogue with different faiths.

What interests me about the young Jewish community is that they are organised, really organised! A good proportion of Jews would be amazed at the extent of Jewish communal organisation and I am sure that those outside the community would also be surprised. Our community is tiny, yet comparatively, our youth groups seem to be one of, if not the most, organised and united youth group community in Australia (based upon my research and studies at UNSW). I find this both astounding and exciting. Few parents may be aware that youth movements have a syllabus, most being thorough, detailed and surprisingly sophisticated, especially



when they are written by young adults aged about 20-21.

Jewish youth movements are entities that I'm passionate about for a reason. Studies show that those involved in youth movements are more likely to stay involved and active in the Jewish community after school. Through Jewish youth movements, kids have the opportunity to develop a greater sense of identity, improve social skills and develop opinions based on both formal and informal activities. Youth movements act as the cement for a strong Jewish community of the future and I am proud to be a facilitator.

How do you think back on your time at school?


