



She spoke in a passionate and polished manner about the importance of advocacy and the UN and detailed her work in the recent trip to Geneva for the Centre for Refugee Research. The purpose of the Centre is to conduct research, education and advocacy programs that focus on international refugee flows, internally displaced people, forced migration and resettlement issues.

Jade also outlined the opportunities available for those interested in her field and stayed afterward to talk with some Year 12 Legal Studies students about after-school career paths.

Jade says "the practical and theoretical aspects of both degrees have built a strong foundation in understanding the macro, mezzo and micro levels of various clients that I will be working with. Both degrees have also allowed me to challenge the ways of thinking and reflect the ideologies of the human rights and rights-based approaches. Last semester I completed my placement with the Centre for Refugee Research. I will be undertaking my final placement in July next year."



# Ryo Hino Class of 1991

Prologue: Throughout my life, if the topic of my academic background ever came up in a conversation, someone would always ask,

"How did you end up at Emanuel School?" So, for the record, I will take this opportunity to explain. Around the time the School opened in 1983, my mother and I had recently moved to Double Bay from Mosman and had to find a suitable primary school in the area. My mother saw an advertisement in a newspaper for The Emanuel School, which caught her eye. The School was close to home (when it was at Temple Emanuel), and apparently promoted



After leaving school in 1991, I was keen on studying in Japan for a while. I spent a year at Sophia University, Tokyo, in their Japan Language Institute program. Being a university student in a major city was such a great experience and this place would be the centre of my life for the next 20 years. In 1992, I returned to Sydney to start my Bachelor of Business degree at UTS. I paid the bills working at Duty Free Shoppers in Circular Quay. But I longed to be back in Tokyo, so after graduation, I decided to live and work in Tokyo for a while. At the time, 'a while' meant around five years, but one thing led to another, and the trip extended to 15 years.

During that time, I experienced some interesting jobs. I have been an English teacher, a news reporter for Bloomberg News covering Japanese economics and policy, an economist at JPMorgan Securities, a listed derivatives sales trader for the same firm, and an institutional marketer for a financial derivatives exchange. The early 2000s was a boom time for the finance sector. But in 2008, the global financial crisis erupted and I was lucky (or unlucky) enough to be on a trading desk to watch markets and investors crumble. At this point, I started to seriously consider returning to Sydney. I waited a while to see if the job market would rebound, but then Japan was tragically stricken with the Eastern Japan earthquake and tsunami in 2011. Prospects for life in Tokyo were bleak.

This event became the main catalyst for my return to Sydney. I moved back last year and enrolled in a Masters of Business in Finance course at my alma mater. I have been studying full-time and now approaching the end of my course. After this, I will try to reboot my career. I was asked where I wanted to be in ten years time. My answer is that the Eastern Suburbs have always been my home. So if I am living comfortably in this area and working at a hedge fund, I couldn't ask for much more than that.

My hobbies these days are mainly weightlifting and DJ'ing. But I still like basketball and remember the days playing on the old concrete tennis court every recess and lunchtime during High School. As for my personal interests, my love for music (Hip-Hop, Soul, Funk, Jazz, Reggae) is what motivated me to pursue DJ'ing, I'm a fan of science fiction, so Lord of the Rings, the Iron Man films, and of course, Game of Thrones, all deserve special mentions as my favourites. My intellectual interests revolve around my work experience, so I'm very

and the mechanics of interest rate changes. These were fundamental tools for my profession in finance), Morris Needleman in mathematics, and the legendary Mr Kerry Crowe-Mai in physics. By no means were they the only good teachers at Emanuel School; indeed there were many of them throughout my time there. What made it so special was that most of the teachers genuinely cared for their students beyond the formal academic capacity. Some taught me more important life lessons, such as honesty, accountability and compassion. This is the Emanuel School that I remember and am proud to have been a part of.

Over the years, I have been fortunate to maintain contact with many of my friends (spanning various years) from school, mainly through Facebook. Among them, there will always be a place in my heart for the small group of Emanuel School founding members and their families, who have blessed me with their love and friendship for 30 years.

As for my fondest memories of school, there are really too many to recall. Camping trips were generally the highlight, and the overnight hikes were especially adventurous. On one of these trips, we camped out on a riverbed. I pitched a tent with David Hirst, while right next to us, there were three or four guys in another tent. Now this was probably Year 8 or 9, so if you put a bunch of us in a few tents in the middle of a forest, one should expect that we're going to be difficult to control. This was especially true in the tent next to me. Typical of our age, one of them decides to test the limits of vulgarity among his colleagues in the dark of night. Screams and yells ensued. By all accounts, the main suspect was Fernando Espinos, though I could not confirm. David and I were chuckling in our tents trying to get some sleep. The teachers had to intervene and Mr Ian Bingham approached our tents to deliver a final warning – go to sleep, or go home. A period of silence fell over the camp. Then, Fernando breaks the silence (again):

Fernando whispers in his tent: "psst.....Ryo, is Bingham there?"

lan Bingham, perched on a rock between our tents, spoke in a typical all-knowing tone: "Yes, Bingham is here." Indeed, Bingham was always there.

Another fit of laughter fell over our tents. Had that been the booming baritone voice of the late Cantor Deutsche, we would have absolutely freaked out. Apparently, lan Bingham must have enjoyed that too because nobody got in trouble that night.

Oh, and while in school, I would like to mention the first school Seder in 1983. I got my first taste of horseradish and *matza*, and I even got my face in the newspaper (I think the *Jewish Times*). Fast-forward about three years, and all of my friends were tied up after school for *Bar Mitzvah* practice. Cantor Deutsch saw that I was left alone one afternoon and graciously offered to give me *Bar Mitzvah* lessons. If that wasn't symbolic of acceptance in the Jewish community, then I don't know what is. The final highlight was my last Shabbat morning assembly in Year 12, where I said the blessings for the bread and wine. The teachers and Rabbi Fox seemed to approve. It felt like a fitting end to a wonderfully colourful school experience. Besides, people always get a kick out of watching a Japanese kid speak some Hebrew...


# Did you follow your field of study at the time?


# Tal Manning (Assoulin)
