Where are some of our Alumni now?

Jonathon Feller Class of 1992

"After finishing Year 12, I was accepted into a BA Communications degree at Charles Sturt University in Bathurst. I was not ready for tertiary study and enquired as to whether I could defer for 12 months. Unfortunately, deferring was not an option so I struggled through a degree that I hated and did not complete, returning to Sydney three years later "empty-handed" albeit with a lot of "life lessons". So, I did not end up in print journalism. I moved into banking after my failed university experience and from banking I transitioned to commercial property finance, working for a leading finance originator until the GFC dashed my ambitions of achieving ten years with that firm. In 2009, I took myself back to school where I completed my Bachelor of Business at UTS majoring in Management and Business Law. Upon completing my degree, I commenced employment at the family property firm that my grandfather and great uncle established in the 1960's.

I did not investigate the opportunity of working overseas when I was younger and travel has never been a major drawcard generally. My travel experiences are somewhat limited and my favourite destination (in all sincerity) is Melbourne. I travel for work and not pleasure.

You ask, "what are your fondest memories of Emanuel School?" I'm going to be "careful" here.... "Mariela Brozky" is my fondest memory of TES (and she knows it after we caught up at the 30-Year Anniversary Celebration at the School three years ago).



I am not really in touch with my group of friends from School. The Class of 1992 comprised 24 students and six of these returned to their country of origin after the HSC. Accordingly, there are 18 personalities (including me) from this year. As work, relationships and family become more involved, it is harder to catch up. That said, I am proud to have completed my secondary education with my former classmates. I hate to say it, however, Facebook has been instrumental in linking post-school connections with my former classmates.

I also repeated Year 11; my first attempt was "ineffective" and I was concerned that even if I applied myself in Year 12 1991, the overall effort would be "unremarkable". It was hard to leave a class that I had been with for six years and see them finish before me. However, it was the correct decision "overall".

I am currently the Company Secretary of Varga Brothers Investments ("VBI"). The company was established by my grandfather and great uncle; both Holocaust survivors who lost their initial families in the death camps. They rebuilt after WWII, re-marrying and coming to Australia from Hungary with their "new" families as refugees in 1948. Arriving with nothing, they fostered a platform for their descendants, through perseverance and sacrifice. It is an honour and privilege to be an employee of my Papa's company and to try and uphold his legacy for our next generations – even more so when I still hold letters (via a typewriter that I wrote to my Nana reporting on my day when I used to do work in their city office as a teenager).

In ten years' time I would like to be fully engaged at work with a post-graduate degree "on the wall". My Papa was visiting one of his buildings to collect rent on the day that he had a heart attack in 1980. Accordingly, it is in my DNA to never retire. That said, I would hope that our ambition to grow the platform and subsequently extend our philanthropic activities is deliverable."

Jennifer Kassell Class of 2001

There was a great article in the Australian Jewish News on 28 October, featuring Lady Gaga wearing a very special leather jacket! The brand Understated Leather (www.understatedleather.com) was born in Austin, Texas, the brainchild of Jennifer and her husband Josh Jones.

What did you do after finishing Year 12? "Ok, now I feel old. I was already working in the fashion industry during school days. In a nutshell, when I left school I attended COFA and was working as the buyer for Australia's then largest fashion website. At the same time, I was also working as global sales & PR manager for Alice McCall. It was interesting to balance both positions, and to experience the industry from two sides at the same time. Both jobs sent me around the world a few times a year, both buying lines from designers as well as selling to leading global stores. As the online store grew exponentially, my position evolved into that of fashion director and required all of my time. After nine years there I moved to New York and opened a showroom representing Australian brands while still buying freelance for stores in Australia. After a year I was head hunted by a large fashion house in California called Planet Blue and so I moved there to be their Fashion Director. About a year or so later, I moved to Austin, Texas and married my husband which is when we started our own brand – Understated Leather. That was a little over two years ago."

Did you follow your field of study at the time? "Not at all – I studied a Bachelor of Fine Arts. It was very enjoyable but it has had no influence on my career path whatsoever. All of the skills that I have needed were either learned in the field taught by incredible mentors or erupted organically. I did not study fashion at any point in my life. My first trip overseas was with a former Emanuel student Tal (Assoulin) Manning when we were 18. Since then I have been to many countries due to work commitments from places like India to Europe, UK, Asia and the USA where I have lived for the last five years. My husband and I own a fashion brand called Understated Leather. We develop pieces for some major fashion accounts here in the USA and have dressed celebrities including Lady Gaga, Beyonce, Kendal Jenner, January Jones, Rita Ora, Emma Roberts – to name a few. It's great to be our own boss and work together every day. Each day we collaborate with many of our creative friends from other brands to photographers, models and general fashion experts. It's a pretty great gig to work every day with your life partner and friends, be your own boss and do what you love. The fact that we have a nice following is just a bonus... (a big one)."

What got you into the industry / when did you become interested in fashion? "I never made a conscious decision to enter the fashion world, it was more of a gradual progression. I was exposed to the business from a young age through family and older friends who I admired. I was connected to the things that these designers were doing rather than the idea of fashion as a career. I knew that I wanted to be a part of that, not because I thought it was cool, but because it just felt right."

Was there an 'aha' moment, or a person was an inspiration to you? "The first person to inspire a sense of self-expression through fashion was my grandmother, Hilda. Her ensembles matched her loud and wild personality. I loved that about her. I guess that I



wanted to emulate this visual element of self-expression at some capacity."

Do you miss living in Sydney / do you come home from time to time?

"I do miss Sydney. It was really difficult for the first few years. I grew up in Bondi,

so the whole area is seeded with memories.

When I think about my childhood – it's all there in Bondi. There is no other place in the world where I will ever feel that connected. Originally, I was coming home once a year for the first few years, mixing business with pleasure and visiting over fashion week. Since starting our business I have not been home, however, I am planning to come visit soon as my little sister Samantha has just had her first baby, which is very exciting for our family. I haven't been back to Emanuel since my sister graduated in 2004. I would love to come back and see some familiar faces."

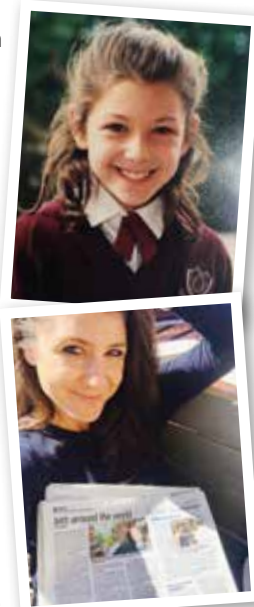
Did you ever dream that your ambitions would take off the way they have? "None of this was planned but I never questioned any of it either. I worked really hard from a young age to climb that ladder. What I have achieved in my career is the result of continual perseverance combined with an incredible support system. My family and friends have been nothing short of amazing, supporting me every single inch of the way. No matter what happened, I always knew they would be proud and that gave me the drive I needed to keep going."

I am currently still working in aged care in community services for Montefiore Home Care where I have been for many years, but have since started a business with my husband in the world of children's literature.

We have written and published a series of children's books called "Jett around the world".

Each book is set in a different city around the world and is about a young boy who travels to these cities and explores the cultures and people. Each book comes with a sticker page and a passport and we have just started producing additional merchandise.

The books have become our main focus and we are now writing the next. Our true mission was to develop a series we would want our kids to read but also to somehow find a way to give back, so we have been partnering with under-privileged schools around the world and have promised that for every 1000 books we sell, we will donate 1000 books to schools and classrooms that need them.

I am also now a mum to a beautiful two-year-old girl and am pregnant with number two. As a family, we of course love to travel and explore and I hope we never lose that.

In ten years I hope to still be writing books with my husband, whether it be this series or the next, and gosh, I'll have kids in High School...that's a scary thought!"

"My name is Samo (Daniel Samowitz).

I was born in Johannesburg, South Africa and at the age of 14 I immigrated to Sydney. Emanuel School swiftly became my second home. Much has happened since then.
