From the **Principal's Office**

Dear Grandparents and Friends of Emanuel School,

As we come rapidly to the end of the year, I'd like to tell you about some of the student initiatives this year in the area of social action, across the School. Volunteering and fundraising for those less privileged than us are ways of life here. Positive Psychology is the basis of our philosophy of student and staff wellbeing at the School. This philosophy shows us that the best way to ensure a life of flourishing is through having a purposeful life and giving one's time for the good of others.

One piece of evidence for this is the way in which all the Year 9 students have embraced the Duke of Edinburgh program this year. This involves them doing community service, among other activities, which they organise themselves. Another is an initiative of our 2012 Social Action Madricha, Aliza Waxman, who organised a comedy evening to raise money for Braveheart, an organisation that protects children at risk of violence. Just lately, our Year 10 students have been given the challenge of raising \$6,000 to pay for a water tank for Genna Radnan's Grandma Jenny's women's training centre in Kenya. Our two trips to the Northern Territory and Jilkminggan School near Mataranka this year have initiated fund-raising for laptops for the students there. Primary School students raise money for a range of charities, including sponsoring children through the PLAN program. This year, the students from K - 12 have raised over \$30,000 for a range of good causes.

Our students have also given their time to help out with a number of other programs. Some of them make a weekly trip to Eastern Respite, spending time and helping out with the disabled teenagers who use the centre after school and during the holidays. Last term, in collaboration with the Holdsworth Centre and Year 10, we had a program of regular visits to the School by young disabled people for afternoon activities, with a band of Emanuel students and teachers to help out. Earlier this year five of our Year 10 students collaborated with the SRC to raise funds to bring Ya, a young Cambodian boy, out to Australia for five weeks. This year our SRC and a group of students have been conversing with an entirely new SRC in Nepal at the Heartland Children's Academy in Kathmandu. The SRC there wanted some tips on running meetings, agendas, ways of operating and so on. Our students not only gave them advice, but also sent over a lot of gifts that they had made by hand.

The different initiatives are many and varied, as are our students, but they all have the common theme of striving to make a positive difference to others' lives.

I hope the end of the year goes well for all of you. Don't forget that 2013 is our 30th Anniversary, with numerous opportunities to celebrate this wonderful milestone.

I hope that you enjoy reading this newsletter and keeping in touch with Emanuel School.

Message from the **Parents & Friends**



The year has flown by and since the last newsletter in July, the P&F has been having fun and fundraising as we work to promote the wonderful Emanuel community of which we are all a part.

This year our Father's Day breakfast for Fathers, Grandfathers and special friends had a huge

turnout and was thoroughly enjoyed by the children in particular, as well as the dads and granddads of course. The children got so very excited spending time with the special men in their lives whilst our merry band of volunteer mums were in the kitchen bright and early at 6am to ensure everyone was well fed.

This year, we trialled new personalised gifts for Father's Day. Children could include their photos or photos with their dads and granddads and these were printed onto mugs or mouse mats. These proved to be an incredibly popular gift offering as well as helping us to raise funds.

The weather was perfect for our Emanuel Camping weekend in early November, which by all accounts was a huge success. 102 people attended in total, made up of 32 families comprising 54 children and 48 adults. A great time was had by all from the Friday night *Kiddush* under the Emanuel Gazebo to the Talent Show on the Saturday night, which proved to be the highlight of the trip. The children loved toasting marshmallows by the open fire and participating in a wide range of activities including bush walking, kayaking and horse riding.

We would like to extend our thanks to you for your support of the Coles and Woolworths voucher programs. This year we collected in excess of 10,000 Woolworths vouchers – a 4,000 increase over last year – and we are pleased to report that the School has already purchased Mathematics equipment for the classrooms, which will be used from next year.

The Coles vouchers were too large in volume to attempt to count and so these are with Coles, who are working to finalise counts and will advise us of our final tally before the year is out.

As a school community, we will be donating a percentage of the Coles vouchers collected to the Jilkminggan School in the Northern Territory.

Our Uniform Shop continues to provide an essential service to our school community, and we would like to extend our thanks to our grandparents who volunteer their time there.

The Triviart event on 11 November was the culmination of many months of work by both the school and the P&F and brought together over 240 families and friends of the Emanuel community.

The spirit of Emanuel shone through the wonderful art produced by our children in conjunction with the teaching staff, through our student volunteers and through the generosity of spirit of our P&F volunteers and sponsors, who worked so incredibly hard to put together an evening which proved to be a highlight of the Emanuel calendar this year.

We were blessed to have the services of Andrew Klein, one of our parents, as our MC and he ensured that the night was a hit right from the start.

The P&F were able to raise in excess of \$10,000 towards the school bus, whilst the School raised funds to support the Artist in Residence program and for the One Laptop per Child program for the Jilkminggan School.

Our parent volunteers have been assisting the School through the Wellness Club programs, the Mitzvah Meals program, and the Olympathon just to name a few of the many activities taking place in the vibrant community that is Emanuel.

As the school year is drawing to a close, we are busy preparing our calendar of events for 2013. Next year will include our usual programs such as the *challah* program which allows families to have *challot* delivered every week, Camping Trips in March and November, Mother's Day and Father's Day etc.

We are also planning some new exciting projects, including a cookbook to tie in with the 30th Anniversary of the School, a book cover fundraiser, and a fete in Term 4. We are very excited to be able to bring the production of *Chocolate, Change & a Skinny Flat White – a Quasi Musical in Oy Flat* to Emanuel in Term 1, 2013.

We thank you for your continued support of the P&F and we look forward to your participation in all our activities in 2013.

"I love my grandparents because they make yummy food".

These are some of the answers students gave when asked why grandparents are special. This year for the first time we combined our *Rosh Hashanah* celebration with Grandparents and Friends Day. Some 300 visitors and 350 Year K-6 students came together in the Lehrer Family Building Multi-purpose Hall (MPH) to enjoy a variety of activities.


The day started with Kabbalat Shabbat run by Year 12 Madrichim, leading their final sing-along for our students before leaving for their HSC preparations. Grandparents together with the K-6 students sang Shabbat songs in a wonderful atmosphere filled with ruach (spirit). The Emanuel parent and teacher choir then sang the song Zochrenu with beautiful harmony conducted by Mr Adam Majsay, Head of Music. Year 5 students prepared a story and rap relating to Rosh Hashanah using movements and drums, directed by parents Debbie Meyer and Josh Oshlak. They gave their time and expertise to this performance and have demonstrated once again the special connection Emanuel has with our community. The finale of the morning was the song Aveinu Malkenu, sung by the Junior Choir and then by all the students, grandparents and friends together. What a moving way to conclude!

Grandparents and Friends then joined the students at various workshops. Years K-1 learned about bees and how honey is made. The students then made beautiful *Shana Tova* cards with their grandparents.

Year 2 students made a coaster in the shape of an apple for a Rosh Hashanah Kiddush cup, decorating it with bright colours and Rosh Hashanah symbols.

Year 3 students together with their grandparents made a *Shofar*. The *Shofar Factory* explained where the *shofar* comes from and the origin of the *mitzvah*. The students then sanded and lacquered their own *shofar*. The whole school was filled with the sound of the *shofar* for the rest of the day and some of us were deafened by the noise.

Year 4 students made beautiful candle holders as well as candles from colourful



Year 5 decorated magnificent *Challah* covers, using the Hebrew words *Shana Tova* and drawing *Rosh Hashanah* symbols.

Year 6 students made round *challah* boards for the *Rosh Hashanah* table. The boards were unique in their decoration and the students were very creative, drawing *Rosh Hashanah* and Jewish symbols and

writing Shana Tova in Hebrew.

Grandparents who have a number of grandchildren at Emanuel School, would have enjoyed a decorative table filled with many artworks that the children produced. The day ended with a sing-a-long in the MPH and a three-generation shofar blowing, which was

very emotional.

It really was a wonderful morning and we look forward to welcoming our Grandparents and Special Friends again next year.

Many grandparents also attended the recent Year 2 Pathways ceremony, in which families joined the children at the weekly Primary School Torah service and formally presented them with their school *siddur*.

This *siddur* will be used by the students during their daily prayers. In preparation for

Pathways, each *siddur* was personalised in a number of special ways. Each child composed their own prayer of thanksgiving and parents wrote their own special prayer for their child, both of which were incorporated in the *siddur*.

Parents and students were involved in various honours during the *tefillah* service. Three generations of the Auerbach family were called to the Torah as representatives of the Year 2 families and to symbolise how the rich heritage of our *siddur* has been passed on

between the generations. "It was very moving to be with the whole family standing together at the Pathways ceremony" said Grandmother, Mrs Wanda Manning. "I am so happy that the grandparents are invited to these special events and we are included in the lives of our grandchildren. It was so special to see Solomon and Shoshana receive their siddur and see how delighted they were with the words written by their Mummy and Daddy. It was also fantastic to see how much Mordechai had learnt since his Pathways ceremony a few years ago."

Before giving their child the siddur, parents were led in the birkat banim – the blessing over the children. After receiving their siddur, students recited the Shechiyanu prayer and led their families in singing Adon Olam. This beautiful ceremony was followed by hugs, kisses and the singing of siman tov u' mazal tov.

The pride and delight expressed by the children and their families over the giving of the *siddur* was something very special to witness. Families shared a quiet moment at the end of the ceremony to read over and share the special blessings they wrote. Year 2 students will spend the remainder of the term joining the weekly Torah service and familiarising themselves with their *siddur*.

Schmooze with a Grandparent...

Rose & Ray Novis

Rose and her husband Ray, were born in South Africa, he in 1932 in Pretoria and she in a country town or "dorp", in 1936. They had happy childhoods with *Habonim* and sport playing a big part in their lives. Vryheid, where Rose did all her schooling, was a predominantly *Afrikaans* speaking town in a coalmining area. There were about 35 Jewish families but there was a *shule* and a *cheder*. Rose has no memory of anti-semitism at school, although Ray experienced it at his state school, both from staff and the boys.

They met (on a blind date) soon after Rose matriculated and were married three years later. By then Ray was a qualified dentist and Rose was in her final year of physiotherapy. Having then saved some money, they went on a working holiday to London, Europe and Israel. Living in London resulted in the development of a love of live theatre and travel that has been an important part of their lives.

Rose and Ray then returned to South Africa and settled in Pretoria where they had four children and lead very busy and active lives. However, the Apartheid Policy of the ruling Nationalist Party was always a concern and in January 1987, they took the big step of immigrating to Australia. Allan, their elder son had immigrated three years previously. Hayley, who had recently finished her matriculation came with them. Unfortunately, Kenneth and Clair who were in their 20s, could not get visas at that time. It was also heartbreaking to leave Ray's aged parents. Starting afresh in a new country when they were in their 50s was a challenge, but in time, the family was reunited and they began enjoying all the wonderful opportunities Australia offered.

When Hayley returned to work after Jordan was born, both Rose and Ray felt it was time to retire and were thus available to care for Jordan three days a week. This has been a fulfilling experience and a great opportunity to be close to a grandchild. They have four older grandchildren, two of whom live in St. Ives and two in Melbourne.

Rose and Ray play tennis, bowls (Ray a lot, Rose less and very badly, she says), bridge and walk regularly. They have maintained their interest in live theatre and the movies. They have attended lectures at Shalom College for many years, which have really enriched their lives. Ray does the gardening, and although their garden is small, in spring and summer it is quite spectacular. Rose likes to do the cryptic crosswords in the *Herald*.

Ray is an enthusiastic sport watcher, so together they have been to many overseas and interstate major sporting events, including Wimbledon five times, three British Open Golf tournaments, three



Olympic Games and nine Australian Open Tennis tournaments, as well as to an Empire Games in Wales and a Commonwealth Games. Ray went to Argentina for the 1978 World Soccer Cup and he also watches rugby at any opportunity.

Rose and Ray's association with Emanuel School began five years ago, when their grandson Jordan Rom started in Year K at the School. Since then, Rose has fetched Jordan three times a week and so feels very close to the School. When there was a request for volunteers to help in the library a few years ago, she jumped at the chance. She volunteers as a library helper every week and now feels she is doing her bit to help at School. As a keen reader, she also enjoys the atmosphere in the library and the friendliness of the librarians and support staff. Besides Rose's observations that the School offers so much to all the pupils, she is particularly impressed by the staff of the Wolanski Family Specialist Learning Centre. "They seem dedicated to helping the students reach their best potential" she says.

Project Heritage: Bringing People Together

The Year 6 Project Heritage Oral Presentations were held in the Lehrer Family Building Multi-Purpose Hall (MPH) on Friday 14 September. The theme of the nine presentations was a "Journey around the World," as our Living Historians originated from all corners of the globe. The presentations were the culminating activity of a term's work, including four interviews with the historians and writing their biography. Students also wrote poetry, information reports and completed some stunning art work.

Our students gave oral presentations in their groups, highlighting the features of their historians' lives, values and achievements through the use of drama, film and multimedia. They also sang two beautiful songs: The first, *Oifn Pripitchik*, is a traditional Yiddish song that had several of the historians happily singing along. The presentations concluded with the song , *I am Australian*, to highlight the journey to Australia that all of the historians have taken.

By coincidence, one of our historians, Erich Pisk, was placed in a group with one of his best friend's great granddaughters, Daniella Gold. It was a highly emotional reunion when Daniella's father, Jeff, and Erich were re-connected after not seeing each other since 1978.

All of our students should be congratulated on the respectful, informative yet entertaining way in which they honoured their Living Historians. Their dedication to this project was outstanding.
