From the **Principal's Desk**

Dear Grandparents and Friends of Emanuel School,

The students and staff were excited to be able to begin to use our beautiful new deck and music rooms that were completed over the holidays at the end of Term 1. The deck provides much additional space for High School students to use at recess and lunch, and the music rooms give us a large rehearsal space and four new practice rooms, thus very much expanding the

facilities for our Music Department. Both of these fantastic additions to our School will be extremely useful. These facilities represent another major step towards the completion of the renovation of our campus and we are very proud of them. We invite you to come and take a look at our new facilities when next you are at the School.

Late last year we commissioned an independent, confidential 'experience' survey of the 2015 parents as part of our commitment to continually monitor and improve the quality of education we provide to our students. This information is most important for our operational and strategic planning, as well as tracking changes in our performance.

For the 2015 review, a total of 290 Primary and High School parents completed the survey. The surveys were extensive and covered in excess of 300 aspects in relation to education at Emanuel School. Overall, we are very pleased with the results. All areas showed improvement on our previous survey from 2013. However, of course there are areas identified where further attention still needs to be given.

In response to the question about what parents valued most about the School, they noted

many aspects of life at Emanuel, including the sense of community and inclusiveness, the warm, safe and nurturing environment, the quality of the teaching staff, the Jewish education, the School values and ethos, the individual student focus, the balanced, quality education and the focus on holistic development and student wellbeing.

I hope to see you at our annual Grandparents Day on 23 September or at some of the many opportunities to watch your grandchildren shine and display their learning that will be happening during Semester 2.



Chavayah 2015

Towards the end of 2015, 56 of our Year 10 students, accompanied by staff members Kobi Bloom and Caroline Laumberg, travelled to Israel on our Chavayah program.



Yael Grunseit, one of these students, writes "During Chavayah each Shabbat was a very special moment for me and will forever be a highlight of the trip. On our first Shabbat in Israel we were presented with the opportunity to go shule-hopping through Jerusalem with one of our teachers, Miriam. I'm not going to pretend that I go to shule very often because I don't, and that can be

partly attributed to the fact that I never really connected with the service. But on Day Seven in Israel, a group of us went to five different synagogues, starting with the Great Synagogue. This was the largest shule we went to, with a very traditional service, something I would expect from an Ashkenazi Orthodox service in Sydney.

The next synagogue we went to was Italian. It was very small with golden and wooden artwork throughout. The service included a lot of singing and community involvement, and you could see the great pride these Italian men and women had in their synagogue. We then continued to walk through the streets of Jerusalem and stumbled across a tiny Sephardi shule. We talked to a group of elderly Israeli men who showed great pride in their synagogue, saying that it is the second oldest Sephardi synagogue outside the Old City. The next place we went was a Moroccan Sephardi Synagogue. This was by far my favourite place. As you walked in you saw metal lanterns hanging from the ceiling that had been donated by each family from the community. There was also a lot of artwork around the shule

donated by families. Whilst we were there they opened the Aron ha-Kodesh for us and we were able to see the traditional cylinder Torah scrolls decorated with fine metalwork. It was such a beautiful shule and an amazing experience. Lastly we went for Kiddush at a Russian Orthodox Chabad



Shule. The men and women were separated and there was a lot of singing of Shabbat songs and food for us all to enjoy.

Through this experience, I really found a new appreciation for religious Jews. I was able to connect with the rich history that Jerusalem holds and I admire the dedication and pride of the people attending these shules. This made me really proud of my Judaism and accepting of others. Ultimately moments like this, throughout the trip, changed me to be a much more open-minded and educated person on all forms of Judaism. Just because I may not believe in a certain way of practice doesn't mean I cannot connect with, respect and admire different practices."

It was inspiring to read the blessings that parents wrote for their children and to see the pride and joy in the faces of the children when receiving their special blessing from their parents. High School Design and Technology students provided delicious Aleph-Bet shortbread biscuits to symbolise the sweet taste of Jewish learning, which they have started to experience at Emanuel School. 

Schmooze with a Grandparent...

Introducing the new president of the Emanuel School Foundation,

Charles Aronson

"I was born in Amsterdam, Holland, the second child of Holocaust Survivors and we migrated to Sydney in February 1951. Prior to leaving Amsterdam, my parents found the surviving child of my mother's sister and her husband, who were both murdered in the Shoah. The little girl had been hidden in the Dutch countryside by the Underground, and when my parents were advised of her survival, they adopted her... so my first cousin became another sister.

After an almost forty-year career in antiques and fine arts, I retired in 2000. In 2002, I started working at the Sydney Jewish Museum as Director of Marketing and Development. I retired from the Museum in 2014 and joined the Museum Board. I now spend most of my time volunteering for the community and helping with my grandchildren.

I have two children and four grandchildren. Thankfully they all live in Sydney. My Emanuel School grandchildren are Samuel and Alice Milner. People are always amused when I tell them I have a child and two grandchildren in the same School. My daughter is Natanya Milner, Head of Primary.

Last year I was asked to take over as President of the Emanuel School Foundation. This Foundation raises funds to assist the School by providing bursaries and scholarships to students who, for financial reasons, may not be able to attend a Jewish day school. The mandate of the Foundation is also to assist financially in any other areas of need in the School. Our benefactors include parents, grandparents and members of the Jewish community who have a desire to contribute to the future of the pluralistic goals of Emanuel School.

Most of my spare time over the past 50 years has been spent in community work. I was President of Masada College for five years, Chairman of North Shore UIA, Treasurer of JCA and Chairman of North Shore JCA, and Treasurer of the Shalom Institute, among other positions. I am currently President of the Emanuel School



Foundation, President of the New South Wales Association of Jewish Ex Servicemen and Women, Chairman of the New South Wales Jewish War Memorial and a Board Member of the Sydney Jewish Museum. In my professional life, I was President of the NSW Antique Dealers' Association for 13 years, President of the Australian Antique and Art Dealers' Association for five years, Chairman of the Australian Bureau of Customs Antique Verification Panel for 25 years and Chairman of the Australian Auctioneers and Valuers' Association Education Committee for many years.

Emanuel School holds a unique position in our community. In educating Jewish children, regardless of their religious affiliations, Emanuel perpetuates the diversity and plurality of our community, engendering a love of Judaism, Yiddishkeit and Israel. For me, a great attraction is the warmth and family spirit which pervade the School. It is such a pleasure to see the kids happy and engrossed. I believe that Emanuel provides a well-rounded, balanced education, leading to future generations of true 'mensches'."


