I hope this latest newsletter finds you and your family well. As we approach the end of another year, we say goodbye to Anne Hastings as she retires, and we welcome Andrew Watt who takes over the reins as

our new School Principal next year. We wish Anne all the best for the next chapter in her life, and thank her for her leadership over the past 8 years.

It certainly has been a busy year. Close to 300 visitors came to School on 15 September to celebrate our annual Primary Grandparents and Friends Day. This is always such a special time with the opportunity for our visitors to watch and listen to Years K – 6 students as they perform and sing for the audience and then go to the classrooms where together grandparents and the children shared time making meaningful Rosh Hashanah-related crafts. On the first day of each school term, we hold a Staff Development Day for all staff. As reported by our Principal Anne Hastings "we were very privileged to be able to hear Dr Jordan Nguyen as our guest speaker for our Staff Development Day on 9 October. The day focused on using ICT (Information and Communication Technologies) to enhance learning. Jordan has been on ABC Catalyst, showing how he has helped a 13-year-old boy with severe cerebral palsy fulfil his lifelong dream of driving a car. Jordan led a team who developed the technology whereby the boy could steer the car with movements of his eyes. Jordan also showed us

some of the advances in virtual reality, which are having great success in helping quadriplegics bear their weight and learn to walk again. It was an inspiring morning, seeing Jordan's passion, enthusiasm and never-give-up approach to finding technological solutions for helping people with disabilities. He had many thought-provoking quotes, such as: 'Today we are seeing the fastest rate of change that has ever existed ... and the slowest rate of change that will ever exist in the future'."

Here is some information about this vital program that was sent out recently to new families starting at Emanuel School next year. We hope more of you, our grandparents and friends, will also get

involved in 2018, particularly to assist with the afternoon shift, 2.45-3.45pm...



A key feature of Emanuel School is its community spirit and the willingness of parents to be involved. The School, in co-ordination with the Jewish Board of Deputies' Communal Security Group (CSG), has implemented a Parents' Safety Awareness program. Similar programs are in place at all other Jewish day schools. Our current global community exists under a heightened threat risk and our Emanuel community is keen to be more vigilant during these current times.





This Emanuel Parent Safety Group (PSG), comprised of parents and grandparents, provides additional eyes and ears around the school perimeter during drop-off and pick-up times. Those parents you see patrolling the periphery of the School every morning and afternoon play a significant role in assuring the safety of all our children and of our School. The importance of this service cannot be understated and cannot be duplicated by paid security guards. The presence of multiple people around the perimeter of the School during these busy times provides a deterrent against any potential threat. Since all school families benefit from having this service, it is expected that all Emanuel families should contribute to this program. The more people who can assist, the fewer shifts each person has to undertake.

The PSG commitment is currently only two shifts per term during the morning drop-off or afternoon pick-up and if every family contributed, the commitment would be even less.

There are no specific skills required and all training is provided. The PSG would appreciate it if you could volunteer your time 7:30-8:30am or 2:45-3:45pm.



Instead of the "Schmooze with a Grandparent" that usually appears in this newsletter, we wanted to share the following with you now...

## Embracing Difference in the Sukkah



Emanuel School recently welcomed refugees as guests to its sukkah, along with students, parents and teachers.

The School's sukkah was truly representative of a global community, with participants coming from Afghanistan, Canada, Chad, Chile, Iran, Israel, Pakistan, Romania, Somalia, Sri Lanka, Thailand, South Africa, and the United States, as well as Australia.

Year 12 student Tomer Belkin's welcoming words:

"Let me start off by saying... happy Sukkot, chag sameach. For a quick little tid bit, Sukkot is one of the 3 pilgrimage festivals. Sitting in the sukkah, according to the biblical explanation, commemorates the 40 years the Israelites lived in sukkot in the desert (for the most part, during their travels, they probably lived in tents, but at oases, a sukkah would be a welcome resting place). It also signifies the end of the harvest season during which time Jews would live out in their fields, in booths/sukkot, to better harvest their field and reap its bounty. One of the ideas behind Sukkot is the idea of impermanence. Staying in a sukkah for a week reminds us of the impermanence our ancestors felt in their desert wanderings. But it also reminds us of the moving we are constantly doing, physically and spiritually. This holiday serves to remind us of the importance of experiences, positive and negative, in our ultimate journeys. It reminds us that our material possessions, whilst to some extent important and necessary, are temporary. We should take solace in the relationships we make, and the things we feel, because there will come a time when we may no longer have what we do now. I may, for example, never see this chair again, but I know that there will be another time when I will be happy, or sad, or scared, or confused. Throughout our lives, our physical placement in the world will change, so let's enjoy the now, let's enjoy this wonderful dinner, each other's presence. Let's laugh, think, connect and feel not as two groups of strangers, but as one, collective, group of people."

"You defined the sukkah as a place of refuge and protection and it was indeed a kind and beautiful gesture," said Asif, a Hazara refugee from Afghanistan. "We laughed, we sang and we shared your food under the sukkah. To see people from different cultural and religious backgrounds under one roof sharing such a beautiful moment is not something we see every day in a lot of countries, but we can make it possible. I wish one day all humankind will come together and live in peace."

Emanuel Year 12 student Sara Bortz agreed: "The Refugee Sukkah dinner has broadened my awareness that difference is not something to be feared, but is rather to be embraced."

Traditionally the sukkah has been a place of refuge and a means of providing a sense of belonging for those who might feel marginalised, Emanuel School Head of Jewish Life, Rabbi Danny Siegel said. "Our guests appreciated the fragility of life as represented by the sukkah in which they were sitting. In embracing others within our sukkah, we felt embraced as well."

After sharing personal stories, challenges and journeys over dinner, guests joined together in singing and playing instruments, led by Philip Feinstein of the Music for Refugees Project.

With English as the common language, among the many other languages represented were: Arabic, Croatian, Dari, English, Farsi, French, Hazaragi, Hebrew, Italian, Sinhala, Somali, Spanish, Tamil, Thai, and Urdu.

Former Emanuel parent Anna Buch, co-founder of Supporting Asylum Seekers Sydney, paid tribute to the School. "Thank you for including all of us in the lovely Sukkot dinner under the sukkah at Emanuel School. It was such a lovely opportunity to all be together from all walks of life and different cultural backgrounds. It is because of this diversity that I found the evening so warm and inclusive. I was particularly struck by the notion that the majority of our friends come from Muslim backgrounds and that for most of them the thought of being in a Jewish school surrounded by Jewish people is quite confronting and, according to their upbringings, frightening. However, as the night progressed, the babies were passed around, the singing continued along with such talented instrumentalists so that the differences between us just melted away and we were left with an interesting and genuine group of people happy to share stories and enjoying each other's company. It was an incredible accomplishment on the part of the School, the wonderful students and the outstanding teaching staff. A special thanks to Emanuel which remains steadfast in its beliefs and consistent efforts to encourage diversity and the human element. Well done everyone and may Emanuel School continue on this path with their open minds and hearts."


