Remembering Jeremy Spinak (Class of 2000)

1982 to 2018

What a mensch, what an enormous loss: the NSW Jewish Board of Deputies (JBOD) dedicated its November plenum to its former president, the late Jeremy Spinak. From an article in the Australian Jewish News, 22 November 2019 by Gareth Narunsky: "Just over a year ago Jeremy stood here and asked that you not forget him - and you have not." Those heartfelt words were spoken by Jason

Spinak at the NSW Jewish Board of Deputies

(JBOD) plenum, which was dedicated to the memory of his younger brother, former JBOD president Jeremy Spinak.

A year on from Jeremy's passing due to a rare form of cancer, his legacy is very much alive. Tuesday night, 19 November saw the announcement of a new Garvan-Weizmann fellowship in Jeremy's name,


two graduates of the Jeremy Spinak Young

Leaders Program speak of their inspiring journeys and the inaugural JBOD President's Award bestowed upon a communal stalwart.

"Jeremy was dedicated to his work at the board, he was very proud of his Jewish identity and it really mattered to him to build a socially harmonious community through his work at the board embracing his Jewish values," Jason said.

"The inaugural President's Award in Jeremy's name, the Jeremy Spinak leadership program and so importantly the announcement of the Spinak fellow at the Garvan-Weizmann Institute - what you have put together for Jeremy's memory is an infrastructure of remembering, of honouring, and of learning."





executive director Prof Chris Goodnow - who reminisced about his own positive dealings with Jeremy - said, "It is all about people that make things happen.

"Jeremy is clearly one of those extraordinary people that made a great deal happen, and tonight, he's making even more happen."

JBOD President's Award winner Josie Lacey OAM (an Emanuel past grandparent), earned the honour for her decades of work with interfaith communities, WIZO, JBOD, the Executive Council of Australian Jewry and other state, national and international forums.

Accepting the award, she recalled Jeremy visiting her home when he became JBOD president, saying "it was very special" to share her knowledge with him.

She also noted that her daughter, integrated oncologist Dr Judith Lacey (an Emanuel past parent), cared for Jeremy as his sickness took hold.

JBOD president Lesli Berger recalled texting Jeremy in the last days of his life for advice on a communal issue.

"He was so dedicated ... that even on his deathbed he took the time to make sure that he responded. What a mensch, what an enormous loss," he said. "Jeremy's left a real void at the Board of Deputies; however, the executive continues to work in his spirit of collegiality and creative problem solving."

Remember September 2019

Ben Wilheim ('08)

Ben with the support of his friends, many of whom are peers from his school days here at Emanuel, started Remember September nearly five years ago, to raise awareness and funds for pancreatic cancer research. Ben, together with his brother David, has organised this annual event in memory of their late father Danny, who died from Pancreatic Cancer at the age of 63, as too did their 33 year old cousin Danielle, sister of alumnus **Ari Feller** ('00). This year's event has seen a new record set, with \$53,780 raised for 2019, bringing the grand total to \$230,000 in 5 years.





Terryn Sesel

Class of 2008, Head Madricha

I loved my days at Emanuel School. I have a lot of nostalgia for the Friday kabbalat shabbat, inter-house music festivals, school camps, sports carnivals, and my amazing teachers and friends. It was such a warm and supportive environment to grow up in and I remember reaching the end of high school and having the confidence instilled in me to do anything I wanted with my adult life. I wasn't set on any particular career pathway but I knew I wanted to study further at university and that I wanted

to spend the majority of my time creating meaning through helping others. Vet science or Medicine seemed like attractive options...

When the HSC results came out I was devastated. I did not score as highly as my teachers had predicted and I felt I let everyone down despite trying my best. My score was not high enough to get into undergraduate Medicine, so I elected to undertake a Bachelor of Medical Science at UNSW with the goal of later studying postgraduate Medicine.

Cells...cytokines...molecular transmitters...microscopic "minutia"! But I wanted to work with people! I realised quickly I am not passionate about scientific research, although I have enormous respect for those who pursue it because without it, modern medicine could not exist. I honestly did not enjoy those three years of studying Medical Science, and apart from my love of playing soccer for UNSW, I remember it as a time tainted by youthful existential angst and self-doubt.

However, my disillusionment with young adult life drove me to escape on a volunteer trip in Nepal over uni break, solo at 20 years old. The volunteer work involved going to schools and orphanages and creating health promotion workshops. I taught the small children about dental hygiene and hand-washing and the older children about first aid and adolescent health. I had to get creative because of my language barrier so there were lots of posters, more charades, and recruiting the help of the teens who could speak English.

These three months were spent living in a remote mountain village with a host family in their home made of mud bricks and a thatched roof. Picture Himalayan mountains and subsistence







farming throughout the valley. How charming! But also picture lack of plumbing and electricity. I learnt to use squat toilets, to eat meals with my hands, and the basics of Nepalese language quickly or else risked being the laughing stock as I routinely played charades to make myself understood.

What a stark contrast to my privileged and consumeristic life back in Sydney! I absolutely loved it. It was humbling to live in an environment that lacked excess and had completely different definitions of "success" – life was all about shelter, food, security, health, and spiritual devotion. It's a harsh life but it also revealed to me the joy in basic human

interactions and appreciating the simple things, such as sharing a warm spicy cup of chai on a cold morning or a full moon that would light the pathway between the rice paddies at night so I could find my way. I felt so connected to people and to nature.

My ability to navigate through this challenging and beautiful experience reinvigorated my self-belief that I can make a difference in the world and strengthened my calling to become a doctor.

Later on, I was lucky enough to study postgraduate medicine at the University of Notre Dame, in Fremantle WA. I loved the city, the studying, and my friends there, though the 5-hour flight was a bit far from my family with whom I am very close.

This year I started specialist training as a Paediatrician at Sydney Children's Hospital in Randwick...just around the corner from Emanuel School! So, I really feel like I've come full circle back to the beginning like a boomerang!

Where to from here? Well I truly believe that one of the keys to success is an unconditional acceptance of life and all that it brings, so without overprescribing too many conditions or goals upon myself, I am awaiting to watch it all unfold...


