Many of our readers would have attended this year's Jewish International Film Festival (JIIF). There were a number of Emanuel connections at the Festival including the film I Am Here, a provocative portrait of the feisty and spirited, then 98-year-old Capetonian Holocaust survivor, Ella Blumenthal, one of our Emanuel great grandparents, who turns 101 next month.

Another school connection with JIFF 2022 is Emanuel grandparent, Vic Alhadeff, who wrote a play about his father's Holocaust story titled Torn Apart by War. The play was part of an evening of theatre called Letters From a Troubled Past produced by Moira Blumenthal.

Reconciliation Action Plan

I am delighted to report that, after a long journey of exploration and preparation, Emanuel School has taken the significant step of submitting a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) to Reconciliation Australia, as part of the Narragunnawali network.

Our vision is to celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and perspectives and to recognise these as valuable and rich sources of learning. We are committed to building genuine, long-lasting relationships with local and wider Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, and to fostering a deep connection to the Land on which our School stands. Our vision is to embed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures, histories and languages meaningfully and authentically within our practice. To achieve this, we seek to equip our staff, students and wider school community with the confidence and understanding to do so, and nurture positive partnerships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. We aim to prepare our students to actively pursue reconciliation, thinking and acting with knowledge, understanding and respect. We have committed to a range of actions, to build respect, relationships and opportunities in the classroom, around the school and within the community.

We are proud of our achievements over recent years, including our strong links to the Jilkminggan community, the strengthening of recognition through our Year 9 Jewish Studies 'Be the Change' elective and our Year 11 Speaker series. 'Putuwa' was introduced on Instagram, which focused on learning and using Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander words, in order to deepen understanding of the culture. With the RAP in place, we look forward to our next steps.



House Music Extravaganza

Our annual High School *Battle of the Bands/Dancers/Singers* did not fail to delight and impress. Parents joined with students from Years 7 to 12 to enjoy a showcase of colour, creativity and fun! The depth of singing and dancing talent within each House was celebrated with raucous support and Szenes House enjoyed an historic win. This student-led event is one of the highlights of our School calendar and showcases the leadership of Year 12 students and specifically, our House Madrichim.

Investment Club

Last Term our Year 12 students launched an Investment Club, inviting well-known and successful business people to share their experiences and encourage the students to delve deeply into the world of stocks and shares. Shaun Micallef's Brain Eisteddfod

I hope you tuned in to Channel 10 to watch Emanuel Year 11 students, Alix Cane, Jake Fleischer, Ma'ayan Granot and Jake Newfield, in their debut primetime TV appearance as contestants on *Shaun Micallef's Brain Eisteddfod*.

The quiz program sees Year 11 students from 18 schools, compete in teams on a range of school subjects including foreign languages, Australiana, mathematics, physics, art, economics and, according to Shaun Micallef, woodwork.



The team, ably lead by Ma'ayan, had no information about the format or content of the show prior to recording and had to rely on their combined general knowledge and that of the Year 11 curriculum areas as they faced their opposition, Balwyn High School, Victoria. Emanuel was the only Sydney Eastern Suburbs School and Jewish School to be selected to appear on the program.

Our emerging leaders

In Term 3, students will select their student leaders for 2022/23. In my final assembly address in Term 2 our students were encouraged to select their leaders wisely:

It is good to remember that before you are a leader, success is all about growing yourself. But when you become a leader, success is all about growing others. The motives for wanting to be a Madrich or Madricha should focus on serving, on giving, on wanting our School to thrive, on wanting to be a great ambassador for Emanuel. It should not be about the prefect badge, the power, the extra ATAR points for leadership, or having it on your CV. Every student in their senior years carries the responsibility of being a leader at Emanuel, whether it be a formal or informal position, or whether they want it or not! In practice, this means that they should:

- Never walk past poor behaviour or bullying in school, but rather, they should intervene and report
- Step in, if the behaviour of our students in the playground, on buses or at the shops is disruptive or rude
- Take the lead and help-out, if a student is upset, or if the canteen needs help, or if an event needs setting up; and finally,
- Be a role model, in the way that our uniform is worn, or the way they contribute to Shabbat celebrations and chaggim, or participate in House activities.

I remain confident in the wisdom of our students to select their leaders based on far more than popularity alone.

Primary School

During Term 1 we welcomed groups of parents and grandparents to our Year 6 Pathways Ceremony during which the students received their first Tanakh. Our visitors also had the opportunity to experience our Purim parades as well as the Year 1 and Year 3 Pesach Seder.

Year K Pathways ceremony: We celebrated and welcomed the Year K students and their families to 'big school' with a special Pathways ceremony, the theme of which was the importance of names, and the meaning and stories behind our names. In preparation for the ceremony, Year K students traced their hand which was then given to their parents to write a special blessing or message for their child. The hamsa-inspired artwork was framed and presented to the

children during our ceremony by parents and grandparents.

Year 4 Tanakh Pathways ceremony: We welcomed parents and grandparents of our Year 4 and new Year 5 students on the final day of Term 2 for our Tanakh Pathways Tefillah and ceremony. Emanuel families practice different streams of the Jewish faith and there are some who practice none and/or are of other faiths. One of the many wonderful things about our School is that it is accepting of all and on 31 May, our Year 7 students and their Jewish Studies teachers went on an interesting excursion called *Tiyul Ani Tefillati*, the *I am My Prayer* excursion, to explore four different synagogues in Sydney.

The students learnt all about the different denominations of Judaism and how the different synagogues express the Judaism they represent.

These are the words of Year 7 student Maya Balkin: "The four synagogues we visited were: The Great Synagogue in the heart of the city, Coogee Synagogue, The Sephardi Synagogue Sydney and Emanuel Synagogue.

The Great Synagogue had truly beautiful architecture, it was really quite grand and felt very established.

It was interesting to hear from Rabbi Chriqui at the Sephardi Synagogue and see what Sephardi Jews do differently and what their customs are.

Coogee Synagogue was nice and small and the Rabbi was very humorous and welcoming. It is a nice Chabad Orthodox shul in our local neighbourhood.

Emanuel Synagogue has a few different congregations under the one roof. We were warmly welcomed by Rabbi Ninio, Rabbi Kaiserblueth and the Rabbi Cantor Mordecai, who explained to us about Renewal, Reform and Conservative Judaism.

We are lucky that in Sydney that we have many options to choose from to express Judaism in many different ways. Thank you to Morah Gaida, Morah Becky, Mr Hajun and Mr Peacock for taking us on this excursion".

Rabbi, I was wondering....?

Year 11 student Arielle Melamed wrote: "Our Year Group was fortunate to recently have had a panel of Rabbis speak to us, demonstrating diversity of opinion within the Jewish community. Rabbi Elton, Rabbi Ninio and Rabbi Cantor Mordecai all answered a variety of questions posed in advance by students, ranging from discussing their path to becoming a Rabbi to gender roles in Judaism to the meaning of life.

Rabbi Elton is Orthodox and is a Senior Rabbi of the Great Synagogue, as well as being involved in interfaith work. He first worked in the Ministry of Justice in London for seven years before deciding to go to New York to retrain as a Rabbi. Rabbi Ninio is a Progressive Rabbi at Emanuel Synagogue. She originally qualified and worked as a family lawyer, before becoming the third Australian-born woman to be ordained as a Rabbi. She is an active leader in social justice. Rabbi Cantor Mordecai is both Cantor and Renewal Rabbi at Emanuel Synagogue and he weaves spirituality, mysticism, music and his Judo-Iraqi heritage into his teaching.

They debated the impact of viewing Judaism through a modern lens, discussing to what extent we should adapt Judaism to better align with modern societal ideals. This prompted the discussion of a key idea of 'choice through knowledge', and the journey Judaism encourages of questioning and exploring morality while balancing our past and present. Their answers highlighted the beauty of each individual's connection to Judaism as well as the shared communal connection to culture, history and stories, emphasising the often-forgotten unique diversity present within Judaism.

We thank Rabbi Ninio, Rabbi Mordecai and Rabbi Elton so much for coming in and answering all our questions with incredible thought-provoking answers".



The semester of Holocaust learning in Year 10 culminated in a tailor-made visit to the Sydney Jewish Museum (SJM). Our students found the experience meaningful and that it greatly enhanced their learning over the semester. A huge thank you to the wonderful Holocaust survivor, Emanuel great grandparent Yvonne Engelman OAM, who shared her incredible journey and memories with us, as well as to Emanuel parent and Museum Educator, Ilana McCorquodale, and Emanuel alumna, Rebecca Kummerfeld, who is the museum's Head of Education, for organising the event. We also are grateful to the Museum Guides and Educators for their invaluable time with our students. One of their guides was Leora Ross, grandmother of Year 10 student, Koby Michel.

If you have never been to SJM, I highly recommend you do so. Established in 1992 by the generation of Holocaust survivors who came to Australia, they envisioned the Museum as a place which could hold their stories and personal objects, memorialise those who were murdered during the Holocaust, and within which the lessons from the past would be taught. It is a living museum: a place that holds the voices of history and in which survivors still share

their experiences with visitors. We thank the many grandparents and parents who volunteer at the Museum.

Did you know our Informal Jewish Life Educators are all past Emanuel students?

Joshua (Josh) New (Head Madrich, Class of 2019) and Mia Shapiro (Class of 2019) work with the Primary School students whilst Asher Klein (Head Madrich, Class of 2016), Daniel Van Sluys Erlich (Class of 2019), Maya Buhrich (Class of 2017) and Kerryn Finn (Class of 2017) work with our High School students.

Primary School Informal Jewish Life

For the last year and half, we (Mia Shapiro and Josh New) have been working at the School as Alumni Informal Jewish Life Educators for the Primary School. Our role ranges from organising and running weekly Shabbatot to creating and running peulot (informal experience-based sessions) for the students, which allow for deeper critical thinking within their Jewish learning. These help the students interact with the curriculum in new and exciting ways and often are a great medium for bringing Jewish content into their everyday lives. Alongside this we are involved in creating ruach (spirit) for the many Jewish Festivals that occur throughout the year.

Some of our highlights so far include working with the Year 6 Jewish Life Leaders and the whole Year 6 cohort on their journey through Leadership Camp. We also created a K-6 Purim scavenger hunt and have loved running festivals such as Pesach, Shavuot and Yom Ha'atzmaut! We've also run plenty of peulot on a range of topics from 'Climate Change and Shmitah (the Sabbatical Year)' to 'Refugees', to 'Personal Journeys of Growth' and 'The Modern Ten Commandments' and so much more.

We've absolutely loved our work at Emanuel so far and look forward to the rest of the year and beyond to bring the *ruach* (spirit) that is Informal Jewish Life at Emanuel.

We have challenged and empowered students to take ownership over their Judaism through various student-run initiatives in the School. Each week we meet with a group of Year 12 students who take responsibility over organising the Friday morning Shabbat service for that week. Together with our team, the group curates the theme, activities, songs and dvar torah, each time bringing exciting ideas and concepts to the rest of the School, in order to bring in Shabbat in a meaningful



way. As well as this, we have facilitated different Year-Group led Shabbatot, in which a small group of students within that cohort plan a special Shabbat for just their Year level. We've also collaborated with other committees in the School, like the social action committee, to incorporate important themes into our Shabbatot, broadening the lens of our service to relate to our wider community.

A huge achievement of the Jewish life team this term was our Year 11 Tikkun Leil sleepover. It was a successful night filled with guest speakers, thought-provoking conversations and an amazing opportunity for the cohort to bond. Speakers presented on a variety of different topics varying from Agriculture in the Shmitah year to designing your own midrash in the style of Matisse, all of which related to the overarching theme, Torah: Revelation, Renewal and Innovation.

We are constantly inspired by the enthusiasm and participation of the students within the High School and can't wait to work with them to continue to bring a vibrant Jewish life to the School!
